About Round Square

Round Square (http://www.roundsquare.org/) is a world-wide association of over 170 schools on six continents, sharing unique and ambitious goals. Lakefield College School was the first Canadian school to become a member of Round Square in 1979. Students attending Round Square schools make a strong commitment, beyond academic excellence, to personal development and responsibility. This is achieved by participating in community and international service projects, student exchanges, conferences, and adventure expeditions, all of which address the Round Square IDEALS of International Understanding, Democracy, Environmental Stewardship, Adventure, Leadership, and Service. The LCS delegation to the 2017 Round Square International Conference in Cape Town, South Africa – which will also include a pre-conference adventure in the neighbouring country of Namibia - will consist of up to five students, accompanied by Gerry Bird, Director of International Programs, and a vet-to-be-named female chaperone.

Namibian Adventure Pre-conference Tour: Overland Camping & River Rafting (Sept 21 - 30, 2017)

Prior to the conference, the LCS group will join delegations from several other Round Square Schools around the world for a unique adventure and cultural experience in Namibia, the country that borders South Africa to the north-west. This overland camping and rafting expedition will be conducted by Bundi Tours (http://www.bundi.co.za/), a company with whom our school has travelled on a previous expedition to South Africa for a Round Square Conference in 2012 – although on that occasion, it was for an 11-day overland camping trip along the "Garden Route" on the east coast of SA.

Traveling in Bundi's comfortable overland trucks (see photo on next page) through the Namibian desert, we will enjoy such memorable experiences as dune boarding at Swakopmundt, working with orphans and primary children at Noordoewer settlement, and touring Naukluft Park with its majestic Sesriem Canyon. We will also visit and climb the towering dunes at Sossuvlei which rise upwards to 325 metres in height. As noted in the Bundi Tours brochure, "The warm tints of sand, ranging from apricot to orange, red and maroon, contrast vividly with dazzling white surfaces of the large deflationary clay pans at their bases." It is little wonder that the dunes at Sossuvlei are favourite subjects of photographers and landscape artists, alike. We will then tour a sanctuary that features four of Africa's big cats and later visit Namibia's spectacular Fish River Canyon, which is "the secondlargest natural canyon in the world and one of the natural wonders of Africa." In the words of the conference organizers: "Cape Town is fondly known as the 'Mother City'. From jaw-dropping scenery to centuries-old architecture mingling with minimalist modern design, this scenic South African city encompasses it all. Discover its buzzing harbour and streets and storefronts. Cape Town's beaches and mountainous surroundings bursting with flora and fauna will ignite your sense of adventure. The city is set against the backdrop of the iconic Table Mountain plateau and sapphire blue Table Bay, famous for its seal population and great white sharks. Cape Town's rich history, modern culture, and incredible attractions make it a true metropolis on the coast and the perfect location to host Round Square's International Conference in 2017."

Selection of Student Delegates

As a Round Square school, LCS is invited to submit applications from students for all Round Square sanctioned projects and conferences. Above and beyond this, we are often invited to join other international schools on their own international undertakings because we have a good reputation in this area for selecting enthusiastic and committed students.

In an attempt to safeguard our reputation and to send out those students who will benefit most from the various international undertakings, as well as contribute enthusiastically and positively to them, we have established the following set of guidelines – which are not necessarily listed below in order of priority - for selecting student representatives. The selection process will be carried out by the International Programs Committee, which is comprised of Academics and School Life faculty and staff, with possible input from the Senior Students in Charge of International Programs.

- students must meet the basic guidelines for age and grade as set by the trip leader
- The International Programs Committee must consider the reputation which the applicant has created for himself/herself in the areas of leadership, dependability, commitment, enthusiasm, attitude, etc. To a great extent, the Committee will rely on the student's Head of House and Advisor for direction in this area, but there may be an opportunity for teachers and coaches to provide input, as well.
- students must meet the deadline for application to LCS's International Programs Committee and to the project leaders. If competition for these placements is stiff, then we may even consider whether the student came to the initial organizational meeting for the project
- the applicant's community service record at LCS may be taken into consideration
- the applicants may be asked to write a letter of application or to submit to an interview
- student seniority may be considered in the selection process (i.e. a student who has been at LCS for three years may be selected over an applicant in their first year at LCS)
- the individual grade level may be considered (i.e. a student in their graduating year may be selected over a younger student since this may be their last chance for participation)
- a student's academic standing may be considered, particularly if the project will necessitate missing class time during the academic year
- the applicant's success will involve considerations of the student's physical or emotional state of health
- any student applicant who applies when on directed or general probation, or on suspension for
 disciplinary issues at LCS, must realize that this will present a major concern for the Committee. Similarly,
 a successful candidate may very well jeopardize his/her participation in the project if the student is
 involved in a disciplinary issue after being accepted (regardless of payments being made, flights booked,
 etc.)
- if the competition is intense for a specific project, consideration will be given as to whether or not an applicant has been on a similar project in the past. Ideally, these experiences will be offered to as many different applicants as possible.

How does the International Programs Committee Make Decisions?

As previously described, The International Programs Committee is a group of Academics and School Life faculty and staff which facilitates selections or approvals, based on the information which is submitted by the students when they apply for projects or exchanges.

For each individual international service opportunity, students must complete an application, in order to be considered to represent LCS on the project. Part of this application is a one-page form for the International Programs Committee, and it asks for details about how long a student has been at LCS, what his/her academic average is, how old s/he is, what kinds of co-curricular activities s/he pursues, how many community service hours s/he has logged at LCS to date, etc.

The Committee also takes into account the support that the individual applicants receive from their Heads of House and Academic Advisor, and also considers whether an applicant is on any sort of disciplinary sanction when applying.

Lastly, the School considers whether or not a student has been involved in an international undertaking in the past, in an attempt to allow as many students as possible to participate in these offerings. This, however, is a complicated issue. We have traditionally allowed as many qualified students to go on exchange as possible over the past few years, and so we try not to hold this experience against them when they apply for a service project or conference (since they have generally not competed for a place and consequently have not prevented someone else from engaging in the experience). Similarly, if a possibility is advertised, and if we can send three LCS student participants, and if we have only three students who apply, then we do not hold it against these students if they are awarded this opportunity and then if they apply for a different project at a later date. Rather, we are happy to see them pick up on this possibility since it would be a lost chance if we did not have three volunteers. Again, the student has not competed and has not eliminated someone else.

As well, the organizers of the Irving Expedition and the Ondaatje Expedition do not consider whether students have been on exchange or involved in an international service project as organized by LCS's International Programs Department when they select participants for these two undertakings. Similarly, it seems fair that International Programs does not hold it against an applicant if indeed they have previously been part of an Irving or Ondaatje Expedition when they apply for an opportunity offered by the International Programs Department.

One proviso on the exchanges and previous international experiences: hypothetical case.... If we had two students apply for one position and if all aspects of their application were absolutely equal, and they both had strong support from their Head of House, etc., and if they each received equal support from the International Programs Committee for one place on a project, then we may look at whether or not one of those two individuals did indeed have such a previous opportunity.

This is the most thorough selection process that we have heard of for student participation in such experiences, but it seems to be the one that is the most fair.

Note:

In an attempt to send out serious candidates who will be positive ambassadors for school and country, all applicants must be approved by the International Programs Committee. If a student is accepted for an international conference or service project and is subsequently involved in a disciplinary incident that is serious

enough to require involvement of the Standards Committee, or if s/he subsequently experiences a significant medical issue, then LCS may have to reconsider and withdraw permission for that student to participate, even if airline tickets have been purchased and project fees have been paid.

Code of Conduct for Student Participants:

All participants should recognize that representing Lakefield College School, themselves, and their home countries on this opportunity is both a privilege and responsibility. **Please be advised that all on-campus rules apply to students on this trip**. These rules include, but are not limited to, those relating to: room visitation, curfews, harassment, appropriate attire, and the use of alcohol, tobacco, and drugs.

There may well be additional guidelines that the tour operator and/or project leaders will outline, relating to the culture of the host country. Students must be prepared to adhere to these rules as well, as they relate to acceptable standards of behaviour, dress, language, etc. Please be aware that other countries may have very different, and often more severe, laws governing such acts as shoplifting, vandalism, disturbing the peace and substance use, and contravention of these laws may have serious consequences for the offender. Should an offense occur, the LCS leaders and tour staff may not be able to intervene on a student's behalf.

As a guiding principle, project participants must always conduct themselves in a manner that demonstrates respect for the culture, traditions and people of the host country, and promotes cooperation, teamwork and unity within the project group. Lakefield College School's international program opportunities are designed to promote leadership, service, cross-cultural awareness and appreciation.

Travel to and within different countries normally requires a heightened level of safety and security awareness, and to this end, specific instructions may be issued by the trip leaders. Students must adhere to these instructions at all times, so as not to jeopardize their own safety or that of the entire group. In particular, participants must follow safety precautions such as being on time for commitments, always travelling in groups of no less than three people, and avoiding overt displays of wealth (e.g., flashing money, expensive jewelry, electronic items, etc.).

The project leaders will deal with any breaches of the Lakefield College School's policies, of this agreement, or of the law throughout the trip. Breach of this code of conduct agreement may result in the student being sent home before the end of the project, and, if necessary, the LCS Standards process will be initiated once the project team returns to campus.
