It prepared us well, leading to careers in advertising & creative writing, education, hospitality, law, architecture & interior design, real estate, hospital administration and entrepreneurship. "Attending MSM with my sisters is a blessing I am forever grateful for. I had the privilege of not only having one, but two sisters attend the Mount before me. Remembering the MSM Bazaar

The sounds! The sights! The smells! Do you recall the storied Mount St. Mary Academy Bazaar of days past?

An annual event anticipated and fondly remembered by many, this legendary MSM fundraiser was a collaborative endeavor of the Sisters of St. Mary of Namur and the laity, most prominently the MSM Mothers Circle. Of course, MSM dads were involved too, typically handling financial aspects of the event. Traditionally held on a weekend in November, it was: "the place to be." With the reach of the Sisters extending deep into the surrounding communities, attendees—including many prospective "Mounties" - hailed from far and wide.

As one entered the school, a notable buzz permeated the premises. There were joyful sounds of laughter, chatter and of course, the whirr and "click, click, click" of the Wheel of Chance! Treasures abounded, both hand-made and home grown.

I remember well my mom, Shirley Reiser, decorating plastic fruit and flowers with gold-leaf-infused varnish to create masterpieces of home décor. She recalls that committee members would find all sorts of items around their homes which were then creatively repurposed as treasures for the Boutique Booth. Likewise, her career making "Raggedy Ann dolls" had its genesis here and they quickly became a popular raffle item!

Sr. Mary Philip could regularly be found in the biology lab, overseeing the plant booth, the contents of which had been lovingly tended to by Sr. Dolorata in the property's greenhouse. Perhaps a handmade birdhouse could be purchased there as well. A plethora of other booths filled the gym and corridors. Reflecting the Academy's foundation in the Catholic faith tradition, art students in 1959 created posters advertising the booths, dedicating each to an appropriate saint. Thanksgiving and Christmas booths were replete with seasonal decorations while aprons, blankets, records, white-elephant items, jewelry, toys, religious articles, craft items created by the Sisters themselves, and so much more could be found in the multitude of other booths. The selection seemed endless, and I am left to wonder how many parents received gifts purchased at the MSM Bazaar?

Perhaps as a young attendee, you remember going fishing in the little gym (also known as the Small Aud) which had been transformed for the occasion into Kiddieland or Funland. Located beneath the chapel, it was filled with activities and games for the younger set. Hopeful young anglers would cast their lines over the seawall on the stage, sure to catch a

A Dive Into the MSM Archives

Since construction first started on Mount St. Mary Academy, our school has collected over 100 years of information, pictures, and artifacts. These pieces of school history live in the MSM Archives, a collection built up over time hosted by the Development Department.

Liz Reiser '75 and Sr. Carol Ann Kleindinst '67 have graciously donated their time and efforts to organize and sort through all the artifacts in the archives in preparation for MSM's Centennial in 2027.

Thanks to their hard work, we were able to come across pictures from the construction of the building's "New Wing" in 1953. This addition to MSM added 30 classrooms including science labs, home economics and art rooms, music rooms, and a real cafeteria. This expansion makes up the majority of MSM today, including the addition of the gymnasium and auditorium in 1958.


small trinket! And how many of us went home having won a goldfish from the fish pond?

The school cafeteria became a dining room during the Bazaar, with students filling the roles of servers, bussers and greeters. Sumptuous aromas emanated from large pots of chowder and the preparation of spaghetti, ham, or roast beef dinners which varied from year to year. Some might contend those scents still linger in our fair halls even today! Likewise, appetites could be satiated in the snack bar or at the pantry booth, which offered baked goods for sale, including wonderful breads baked by Sr. St. William and pies and cookies made and donated by others. Those with a sweet tooth could head over to the candy booth for Sr. Mary Powell's peanut brittle.

Based on articles found in the school archives and shared by the Sisters, the Bazaar was well publicized in local newspapers. Begun in 1931, the MSM Bazaar was a themed event, with many hands contributing countless hours towards its planning, preparation, set-up and successful production. On the occasion of its 40th Anniversary in 1971, the hope was to raise \$10,000. While that may not seem a lofty goal by today's standards, it should be noted that tuition for the 1971-1972 school year was \$400.00, payable in ten monthly installments of \$40.00.

It is likely the Bazaar continued for another decade or so, at which time the festive Medieval Faire took place for a few years, followed thereafter by today's signature fundraiser: Chrysalis. Our hearts are filled with gratitude for the many moms, dads, and of course, our beloved Sisters, who worked so diligently to make the Bazaar a success, thus ensuring the fiscal solvency of MSM and an excellent educational opportunity for generations of "Mounties".

TEACHING YOUNG CHILDREN LIFE SAVING SWIMMING SKILLS: A MOUNTIE ENTREPRENEURIAL STORY

Swimming has always been a large part of my life. During my high school years at MSM, I swam on the varsity swim team and was a member of the Tonawanda Aquettes. I later became the head coach of the MSM Swim Team until 2015.

Once I had children of my own I knew I wanted them to be safe in and around the water. When Covid hit and I was stuck home with my newborn twins and 2 year old son, I started researching swim programs. I quickly realized there were no survival swim programs anywhere in WNY. Drowning is the leading cause of death in children ages I to 4 years old. I knew then I wanted to become a certified survival swim instructor with ISR (Infant Swimming Resource).

ISR is the global leader in survival swimming. How are ISR survival swim lessons different from traditional swim lessons? I work with children as young as 6 months old and teach them through sensorimotor learning how to react if they were to ever find the water unattended. Children from ages 6 months to 12 months learn how to hold their breath and roll onto their back and sustain a float. Once children are walking, they can learn to swim then roll onto their back to rest and then roll back onto the stomachs to continue to swim.

I work with children of all abilities up to age 6 with hopes that they develop a love for swimming. I am thrilled to be offering these lessons with hopes to continue educating families and keeping children safe in WNY.




Giving Day 2023
