## MISSION STATEMENT

La Jolla Country Day School prepares individuals for a lifetime of intellectual exploration, personal growth and social responsibility.

## THE SCHOOL COMMUNITY

LJCDS traces its beginnings to the Balmer School, founded in 1926 by Louise C. Balmer. A small cottage on Coast Boulevard served as the schoolhouse for the four children who first attended the primary school. Today, LJCDS stands on a 24-acre campus in University City. From age 3 through Grade 12, the school serves a diverse student body of 1,147 drawn from various San Diego County communities, the United States and the world. LJCDS' challenging curriculum prepares and positions students of character to excel academically, athletically and artistically. In 20212022, LJCDS awarded $\$ 4.7$ million in financial assistance. The Class of 2023 has 124 students.

## DIVERSITY STATEMENT

As an essential component of the school's commitment to dignity education, LJCDS values an inclusive community committed to equity and justice for all constituencies. We welcome all genders, orientations, religions, beliefs, races, cultures and ethnicities. The LJCDS community represents students, faculty, staff and trustees of different cultural, ethnic and socioeconomic backgrounds. About $26 \%$ of our students selfidentify as students of color and 16\% self-identify as mixed race. LJCDS believes a diverse community contributes to a more enriching experience for every adult and student. The school prepares students to be global citizens to ensure that every child has the skills and awareness to embrace humanity in all of its diversity.

## CLASS RANK

LJCDS does not rank students numerically because of our high academic expectations, outstanding student learners and small class size. Instead, the school reports individually weighted grade point averages.

## GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students in Grades 9-12 generally take five or six academic courses each semester. The only exception is for seniors, who can carry four courses if all graduation requirements are met and all four courses are AP. The academic requirements for graduation include a minimum of 20 units.

## ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Experiential Education Week: Freshmen attend a class-wide program while sophomores and juniors choose from a variety of options including college trips, service programs and outdoor-focused adventures. Seniors may elect to participate in school-sponsored programs, take college tours on their own, or use the time to focus on college applications.

Dignity and Health/Wellness: All students in Grade 9 enroll in two semester-long courses focused on mental health, suicide prevention, nutrition/body image, sexual health, substance-use education and identity.

Physical Education/Athletics: All freshmen must participate in a team sport for one season.
Service Learning: Students participate in four years of service learning through a combination of classroom participation, hands-on experiences, thoughtful reflections and completion of an independent service-learning project during senior year. Students may receive a service-learning award if 200+ hours are completed by graduation.

## CURRICULUM RIGOR

All Honors and Advanced Placement (AP) courses require approval from the head of Upper School and completion of prerequisites for admission into the course. Honors and AP courses also require an annually renewed recommendation from both the current teacher and department chair. It is not unusual for students to switch on and off the Honors/AP curriculum at different points in time. Honors and AP courses are offered in all disciplines; courses that represent a second year of study are designated by the term "Advanced" and are considered Honors courses (e.g., Advanced Robotics).

In addition, students may consult with faculty to pursue an Honors distinction in select courses where they exceed the traditional curriculum and explore topics in greater depth and breadth. Distinction is earned through Honors-level assessments and special assignments. Courses are subject to change.
